

Black Studies and the Shifting Winds of our Nation: Strategies for Advancing the Discipline.

In recent years and the foreseeable future, the political climate of our country is shifting against supporting diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts, and centering Black history and culture in K-12 and even university curricula. This is illustrated by book banning movements and state government mandates to suppress or exclude Black Studies in states such as Florida, Texas, Georgia, and others. Such movements are also compounded by the larger trends of students moving away from the humanities towards business and STEM fields, leading to decreases in enrollments and majors for humanities and humanistic social science fields and disciplines, including Black Studies departments and programs. Essentially, Black Studies is at a critical crossroads with significant implications for its future.

3:50 - 5:20 pm Mentoring in a Time of Crisis

This panel will address what it means to mentor and be mentored during a moment of crisis— a moment of brutal anti-Black assault in higher education, in the U.S. and across the globe. This convening recognizes this moment as both a continuation of a much longer history of global anti-Blackness, and a more recently accelerated phase of attack, facilitated in part by the rise of authoritarian, nationalist, and white supremacist governments, particularly in the U.S. and Europe. This panel will convene a group of scholars who can share their experience about how to navigate hostile university landscapes in this moment, create support structures for students and faculty of African descent, identify resources in environments premised on austerity, and broader inspirations for how to thrive, care, and create in the midst of this kind of social violence.

REP. CORI BUSH

Keynote Address, Thursday, Oct. 30, 5:00 - 6:00 pm, Landmark 4 - 7



Rep. Cori Bush is the first African-American woman to serve in the U.S. House of Representatives from Missouri. She served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 2021 to 2025. She is a nurse, pastor and Black Lives Matter Activist. Rep. Bush's progressive policies from advocating to defund the police, pro-choice for women and call for a ceasefire in Gaza earned her a reputation as being a member of the "Squad" during her Congressional tenure. Her advocacy continues as she's secured over \$13 million in federal earmarks to fund projects like emergency food and shelter services and housing redevelopment in the St. Louis area. She has tirelessly worked to combat voter redistricting efforts in St. Louis and has just announced her new campaign to win back her seat in Congress.

FILM TITLE: BLACKsmiths of Morocco

Filmmaker: Henry Drewal

Country of Origin: USA/Morocco; 12:42 minutes

SYNOPSIS: Most Moroccan blacksmiths claim roots in Black Africa. For centuries, their enslaved or conscripted ancestors traveled the trans-Saharan caravan routes from West Africa to the fabled fortified city of Sijilmasa in present-day Morocco., and from there to many other places in northern Africa and beyond. Today blacksmiths forge all manners of tools and architectural works — window grilles, doors, hinges, locks, knockers, and elaborate keys — with consummate skill.

FILM TITLE: TAMBU Filmmaker: Laurie Lambert

Country of Origin: USA/Jamaica; 15 minutes

SYNOPSIS: The word "tambu" is used throughout the African Diaspora to describe various drumming traditions and styles. TambuFest is a day-long celebration of diasporic practices of drumming and dance in Jamaica, highlighting cultural groups from Kingston, Port Maria, Islington, Manchioneal, Charlestown, and St. Thomas. The festival was conceived of and produced by musician Junior "Gabu" Wedderburn, UPenn anthropologist Deborah A. Thomas, and Dr. Nicholas Ferguson, a medical doctor and drummer for several years. "Tambu" is a short film that combines footage from this festival, with archival photographs, to explore how these drumming and dance rituals remember Jamaican histories of slavery, indenture, and survival. Through music and movement, the performers honor and communicate with their ancestors, making these performances a way of sharing ancestral knowledge. The film foregrounds the intergenerational character of the festival—the ways that these drumming and dance practices are taught and passed down from elders to younger people while inviting the community to share in a collective energy. "Tambu" explores how Jamaican folk practitioners create spaces for healing through prayer, the sharing of food, drumming, song, and dance. Their folk practices nurture both the physical body and the spiritual being. "Tambu" explores how these rituals build community by bringing together African and Caribbean history, dance, music, language, and foodways.

FILM TITLE: BLACK LIVES MATTER IN BRAZIL

Filmmaker: Gladys Mitchell-Walthour

Country of Origin: USA/Brazil; 24:39 minutes

SYNOPSIS: This documentary includes footage of protests to combat police brutality and harassment of Afro-Brazilians and interviews with key leaders and scholars in the fight for human rights in Brazil. It also includes interviews with scholars and activists from Peru and Argentina as well as experts on Latin America located in the USA. Dr. Gladys Mitchell-Walthour discusses the history of Black resistance since the time of enslavement as well as the need for Afro-descendants to come together to strategize methods to combat racism as a collective. This documentary tells the story of the violence and marginalization Black people face throughout Latin America, the efforts they have taken to overcome them, including solidarity and displays moments of joy when connecting with each other.

FILM TITLE: BIGGER THAN AFRICA

SYNOPOSIS: When the Slave ships docked in America, Brazil and the Caribbean, hundreds of cultures, traditions, and religions landed with the Africans on board, one transcended slavery beyond imagination and remains alive till

this day in the New World: the Yoruba culture. This Documentary takes you on a journey through Brazil, The United States, Cuba, Trinidad & Tobago and back to where it all began in West Africa. This Yoruba Culture was said to have survived Slavery & arduous plantation life to become the most prominent African culture in the New World.

FILM TITLE: "TINA, WHEN WILL YOU MARRY?"

Country of Origin: Canada/ Nigeria; 8:25 minutes

SYNOPSIS: It's present day, and we meet Tina, a 30-year-old first-generation Nigerian-Canadian filmmaker living in Toronto. At thirty years old, the pressure to get married is more intense than it's ever been, and she is adamant about carving her own path while silencing outside voices that try to dictate what her life should look like. Next, we meet Yemi, Eniola, and Tina, and explore their unconventional thoughts and experiences regarding marriage. This documentary touches on a much broader conversation about 'Tradition vs. Modernity', bridges the gap between the generations that advocate for either, and encourages a culture of accommodation and inclusivity.

FILM TITLE: THE INCREDIBLE SENSATIONAL FLANCÉE OF SÈYÍ ÀJÀYÍ

SYNOPSIS: In the whimsical Pan-African society of Alkebulan, a brilliant scholar discovers her fiancé's secret engagement and takes spectacular revenge, earning the recognition she always deserved in an unexpected way.

FILM TITLE: AL-SIT

Filmmaker: Suzannah Mirghani Country of Origin: Sudan; 20 minutes

SYNOPSIS: In a cotton-farming village in Sudan, 15-year-old Nafisa has a crush on Babiker, but her parents have arranged her marriage to Nadir, a young Sudanese businessman living abroad. Nafisa's grandmother Al-Sit, the powerful village matriarch, has her own plans for Nafisa's future. But can Nafisa choose for herself?

SYNOPSIS: This evocative documentary examines the spiritual practices of Santería and Candomblé in Berlin, showcasing rituals and performances from Germany's only Candomblé house. Through its lens, the film captures the enduring cultural and spiritual significance of these African-origin traditions, bringing their essence to life in a Berlin context.

FILM TITLE: Dancing Gods: Celebrating Ondoo, Aré, and Esù-Elégba in Pobé, Bénin. Republic
